SERVICE ON THE RMMLA EXECUTIVE BOARD

In Fall 2026, we will be seeking nominations for a new:

- **Vice President** in 2027 (who will serve as President in 2028 and Past President in 2029). *This person must be from a field other than English or Technical and Professional Writing.*
- **Delegate at Large** (3-year term, 2027-2029). *This person must be from an English- or Technical and Professional Writing-related field.*
- **Graduate Student Delegate** (2-year term, 2026-2027). *This person must be from an English- or Technical and Professional Writing-related field.*

Service on the Executive Board entails attendance at two meetings per year, one online in the spring and the other at the fall convention. Candidates must have a personal or institutional commitment of funding for travel to the board meetings. Board members receive a \$500 stipend for in-person meetings and convention lodging and complimentary Convention Registration from RMMLA to help defray the cost of travel.

Members of the Executive Board consider and vote on such issues as new Special Topic Session proposals, changes in procedures, selection of recipients of RMMLA awards, convention sites, membership services, the annual calendar and budget, fund-raising ideas, dues schedule, etc.

In the fall, the Executive Board gathers all nominations and prepares a slate of candidates based on geographical and area of study factors. The slate of candidates is then presented to the membership on the website. *Members have until December 31 to vote on the RMMLA website.* Ballots are counted on January 1 and election results are announced soon thereafter.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ROCKY MOUNTAIN MODERN LANGUAGE ASSOCIATION

Article I – Name and Purpose

Section A. Name

This non-profit organization shall be known as the Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association, hereafter referred to as the “Association.”

Section B. Purpose

The purpose of the Association will be to promote study, critical inquiry, teaching, and research in the fields of languages, literatures, and the humanities by holding annual meetings for the presentation and discussion of papers about language, literature, and related humanities fields, by holding sessions for the discussion of issues in teaching as a profession, by collaborating with other academic and cultural societies in the organization of literary and cultural events, by regularly publishing a scholarly review, and by promoting other similar activities as convenient and desirable.

Section C. Statement of Nondiscrimination

The Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association does not discriminate on the basis of national, ethnic, or racial origin, gender, sexual orientation, age, disability, or marital status. The Association supports the academic and personal freedoms of each of its members. It believes that any form of discrimination, harassment, or abridgment of human rights is a threat not only to those individuals who are subjected to said discrimination, harassment, or abridgment of human rights, but constitutes an assault on the concept of freedom that is embodied in the Constitution of the United States.

Article II – Membership and Governance

Section A. Membership

1. Teachers, students, and scholars of languages, literatures, and other humanities-related fields, as well as those with similar interests (i.e. both those with academic affiliations and independent scholars) who support the mission of the Association may become voting members of the Association by payment of the dues as established by the Executive Board and may be continued as members by payment of annual dues.
2. Membership in the Association is considered by calendar year (January through December).
3. Libraries, departments, and other institutional units may join the Association as non-voting subscribing or sustaining members by payment of the dues as established by the Executive Board and may be continued as members by annual payment of such dues.
4. Other associations whose interests parallel those of the Association may petition to become non-voting conjoint or affiliated members of the Association. Members of these conjoint or affiliated organizations must become members of the Association and pay convention registration fees in order to participate in the Association’s annual meeting.

Section B. Officers

1. The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice President, and a Past President. Each officer serves for

a term of one year in each of the three positions, with a pattern of succession as follows: as elected Vice President in the first year, as President in the second year, and as Past President in the third year. The election of the Vice President takes place by mail or electronic ballot after the annual meeting. In alternate years, the newly elected officer shall be an individual whose primary professional activities are in English/Technical Writing or Foreign Language/General Studies.

2. The Executive Director/Treasurer shall be appointed by the Executive Board for a three-year term, renewable at the discretion of the Executive Board.
3. The term of each officer begins on the day after election results are finalized, usually on January 1. The term of any appointed officers begins on a date determined by the Executive Board.

Section C. Executive Board

1. There shall be an Executive Board consisting of eight voting members: the President, the Past President, the Vice President, three Delegates-at-Large, and two Graduate Student Delegates, all of whom are elected by members of the Association by mail or electronic ballot after the annual meeting. All current members of RMMLA are eligible to run for election on the Executive Board, either as an officer or as a delegate. A Board member will be eligible for nomination and election to office for a new term after a hiatus of one year.
2. The three Delegates-at-Large shall serve for three years, with one member to be elected each year, so that terms are staggered, rather than concurrent. In alternate years, the newly elected delegate shall be an individual whose primary professional activities are in

English/Technical Writing or Foreign Language/General Studies.

3. The two Graduate Student Delegates shall be elected one every year for a staggered rather than concurrent set of two-year terms. In alternate terms, the newly elected delegate shall be an individual from English/Technical Writing or Foreign Language/General Studies.
4. The Executive Board also consists of at least two or more ex officio, non-voting members who are appointed to the Board by the officers and the delegates: the Executive Director, who also acts as Treasurer, and the Editor(s) of the Rocky Mountain Review and the Rocky Mountain E-Review. The Executive Board may appoint other ex officio members as it sees fit.

Section D. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year shall begin on January 1.

Section E. Annual Meetings

The Association shall hold an annual business meeting and a scholarly convention at such place and time as the Executive Board shall determine. The business meeting and convention may be canceled for emergency reasons by vote of the Executive Board. If an annual business meeting or convention is canceled, the elected officers and the members of the Executive Board shall endeavor to meet via some means in order to conduct the necessary business of the Association. Election of new officers is held in late fall whether or not the annual meeting is held (see Section C. 1. above).

Section F. Dissolution

1. The Association shall be dissolved upon the affirmative vote, by mail or electronic ballot, of at least two-thirds of the membership in good standing at the time of the vote, but only after

the matter has been moved, discussed and decided by the Executive Board, as well as at the Association's Business Meeting held at two consecutive annual conventions.

2. In the event of the dissolution of the Association (see Section F.1. above), all funds remaining after payment of accounts due shall be given to the Modern Language Association of America or to another such non-profit professional organization as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), as the Executive Board shall designate. Any assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the proper Court of the state where the principal office of the Association is then located, as said Court shall determine.

Section G. Miscellaneous

Notwithstanding any other provisions contained herein, the following shall apply:

1. No part of the net earnings of the Association shall inure to the benefit of or be distributable to any member or officer of the Association, or other private persons, except that the Association shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth exclusively in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as further limited by this Constitution.
2. The Association shall take no part in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.
3. The activities of the Association shall be restricted to those permissible (a) by

an organization exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by an organization, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

Section H. Amendments

1. Amendments to this constitution shall be made upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds of those members responding to a mail or electronic ballot.
2. Before presentation to the Association, all amendments to this constitution must be submitted in writing for the consideration of the Executive Board, which in turn has the responsibility of submitting the amendment to the membership at least two months before the next annual meeting (by a means approved by the Board), so that a vote on the amendment can take place at this meeting. If the Executive Board disagrees, however, with the proposed amendment, the member proposing the amendment may bring the amendment forward at the next annual meeting, provided that (a) that the membership receives the text of the amendment at least two months before the annual meeting, and (b) the Executive Board be allowed to accompany the text of the amendment with such comments as the Board deems appropriate or necessary. The Executive Director shall offer to post the text of the proposed amendment, together with comments of the Executive Board, on the Association's web site, but is not obliged to mail such text to the general membership.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE RMMLA CONVENTION

The Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association is one of the smallest of six regional Modern Language Associations, although it serves the largest geographical area. The size of the territory made traveling to national meetings difficult and expensive, leading to the founding of the RMMLA in 1947. The proposal for the formation of the organization outlined what later became adopted as the statement of purpose: to stimulate consideration, evaluation, and cultivation of languages and literatures by holding annual meetings for the presentation of papers about language and literature, by holding sessions for the discussion of problems in teaching as a profession, by cooperation with other academic and cultural societies in order to enrich and strengthen the cultural life in the Rocky Mountain states, by regular publication of a bulletin, and by other similar activities as convenient and desirable. The organizers were T.M. Pearce, R.M. Duncan, J.M. Kerchville, W.W. P. Albrecht, W.D. Jacobs, A. Lopes, and Katherine Simons, primarily from the University of New Mexico. T.M.

Pearce later wrote to Ingeborg Carlson, Arizona State University (Executive Director of RMMLA 1978-1984).

Since a good many faculty members had belonged to the Modern Language Association before coming to the Rocky Mountain states and had attended post-Christmas meetings, usually held on the east coast or in the mid-west, there was a general feeling that the Rocky Mountain area could profit from a regional association. For this reason I consulted with Professor J.M. Kerchville, Modern Languages Department, University of New Mexico, and with other members of that institution about forming such an organization. Through correspondence and planning we prepared for the first meeting of the Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association, to be held in Albuquerque on Friday and November 28 and 29, 1947, upon the invitation of the University of New Mexico. The Association held its first General Meeting in the Ballroom of the Hilton Hotel on Friday at 4pm. The Chairman was Levette Davidson of the University of Denver.

RMMLA ANNUAL CONVENTION GUIDELINES & PROCEDURES

GENERAL GUIDELINES

Membership

- RMMLA is an organization for its members.
- Membership in RMMLA is for the calendar year.
- *Everyone whose name appears in the convention program—session chairs, presenters, discussants and respondents—must pay applicable membership dues and convention registration fee (even those from any of the local host institutions).*
- All Session Chairs at the convention must be current in their membership dues by **November 1** to be listed in the Call for Papers for the following year's convention.
- All presenters must be current in their dues by April 1 of the convention year to be listed in the program. If dues are not paid by this date, that person's name will not be able to be listed in the program. If dues are made current, and a slot remains in the session, however, that member's name will be reinstated in the program.
- Dues and Convention Registration must be paid by mail using a check or online using VISA/MC.
- Interested faculty, students, or others who are **not** presenting at or participating in the convention may attend the convention without paying membership dues.

Convention Registration for Chairs, Presenters and Discussants

- All convention participants (session chairs, presenters, discussants, and respondents) must pay the applicable convention registration fee (even those from any of the local host institutions). Payment of this fee gives the participant access to all regular and special topic sessions.
- The early discounted convention registration fee (deadline in the RMMLA Calendar; postmark or transaction date deadline) includes a program, admission to all sessions and non-fee special activities, AND a ticket to the banquet.
- The regular registration fee (deadline in the RMMLA Calendar; post-mark or transaction date deadline) includes a program, admission to all sessions and non-fee special activities, AND a ticket to the banquet/keynote address.
- The late registration fee includes a program and admission to all sessions and non-fee activities, but it does not include a banquet ticket.
- No refunds or reductions are given if one cannot attend the banquet due to a scheduling conflict or other situation.
- Each registrant receives a convention badge, which must be worn while attending convention sessions and events. The facilities and services of the convention are available only to registered attendees.

- Special workshops may require an additional fee. Any such fee will be clearly labeled on all registration materials.
- The Executive Board reserves the right to deny future participation in the convention to any chair or presenter who does not pay the registration fee or who does not follow guidelines and procedures.
- Requests for refunds of convention registration fees must be made in writing to the Secretariat and must be postmarked no later than September 1. A \$25 service fee is deducted from all refunds. No refunds are given after this date.
- Each year, the Executive Board authorizes a limited number of dues and/or convention fee waivers for special guest speakers/respondents/discussants in a regular or special topic session. Those who are eligible to receive such funds include distinguished persons in fields represented by the RMMLA, creative writers who do not have academic positions, scholars who reside outside the United States and Canada, and RMMLA honorary members and fellows. Such speakers would only be required to purchase a banquet ticket if they wish to attend this function. Session chairs who wish to invite such a guest speaker should contact the Executive Director no later than March 1, specifying the speaker's discipline or profession, as well as a statement explaining how the speaker would enrich the program. Please note that waived non-members may not organize or chair a session.
- Convention Registration for NON-Presenters •Administrators, faculty,

and students from the Local Host institution(s) and the local host community who are NOT chairing or presenting at the convention may attend sessions and non-fee activities without paying the convention registration fee or membership dues. They will receive a free program and a convention badge at the registration table upon presentation of a school ID or a RMMLA Free Pass. Tickets for receptions and other meal functions may be available for purchase at the registration table (subject to availability).

- Administrators, faculty and students from institutions other than the host institution(s) who are NOT chairing or presenting at the convention may choose to pay either the full convention registration fee with all privileges (see above) or a weekend registration fee of \$25 (payable at the registration table). The weekend rate includes ONLY a program and admission to sessions and non-fee activities for that day, no meal functions. Tickets for receptions and other meal functions may be available for purchase at the registration table.
- Family members who wish to attend only the session in which their relative is presenting may attend that particular session free of charge, but are asked to come to the registration desk to get a badge.

LOCAL HOST(S) TO RMMLA CONVENTION

- Each year, local host institutions are sought to serve as the host institution(s) for the Association's annual business meeting and scholarly convention. Service as a local host institution is a

concrete symbol of that institution's support of the mission and activities of the Association, and is necessary if the Association is to continue serving its members by organizing such a professional gathering.

- Invitations from institutions that wish to host the annual convention may be received by any member of the Executive Board and are acted upon by the Program Committee, in consultation with the full Executive Board.
- Information on the types of assistance (logistical and financial) given by the local host institution to the Association is available from the Executive Director upon request.

TYPES OF CONVENTION SESSIONS

Types of Sessions

- Sessions at the convention are arranged by RMMLA discussion groups, individual members, members of the Executive Board, affiliate organizations, and committees of the Association.
 - There are five types of sessions: Regular Sessions, Special Topic Sessions, Forums, Special Events, and Affiliate Organization Sessions.
1. **Regular Sessions.** Regular sessions encompass the primary scholarly and professional interests of Association members.
 2. **Special Topic Sessions.** Special topic sessions are organized by members to exchange ideas on topics of limited scope. The Program Committee of the Executive Board reviews all such session proposals and selects those to be held at the convention, based on the rationale for the session and space available.

3. **Forums.** Forums are meetings on topics of broad general interest to members.

4. **Special Events.** Special events, including readings, films, performances, etc., may be proposed by members for consideration by the Executive Board.

5. **Affiliate Organization Sessions.** Learned societies and professional organizations that have been granted affiliate status may each organize one 90-minute session at an RMMLA convention, but may be granted additional sections for a business meeting or other, as space permits, outside of the normal convention session hours. Affiliate organization sessions and social functions that are listed in the convention program are open to all persons registered at the convention, unless otherwise noted in the program.

Regular Sessions

- Regular sessions are open-topic sessions lasting ninety minutes at which members present scholarly papers on topics related to teaching and/or research in languages, literature, film, and/or culture.
- Each regular session has a presiding officer called a Session Chair.
- Any regular session that does not convene for three consecutive years will be struck from the roster of regular sessions. It may be reinstated upon written request by ten current members of RMMLA.
- To establish a new regular session of the RMMLA convention, members should first propose a special topic session of the same name to the Executive Board. After

three consecutive years of successful meetings of this special topic session, a petition for permanent status should be addressed to the Executive Board. The petition should include a statement of purpose, a rationale for making the session a regular session, and the signatures of at least ten current RMMLA members in support of giving the session 'regular' status. The Executive Board will vote on this request at its spring or fall meeting or via electronic means.

Special Topic Sessions

- Members in good standing may propose one Special Topic Session per year for listing in the Call for Papers that is published in mid-November. A session title, a short description of the topic, and the contact information of the proposed chair is to be sent to the Executive Director by November 1. A rationale citing the nature and validity of the topic and why it does not replicate existing sessions should also be included. The RMMLA reserves the right to edit the topic description submitted for inclusion in the Call for Papers.
- All special sessions must be approved by the Executive Board based on the rationale and the availability of meeting space. The Executive Board approves the special topic sessions and the Executive Director informs the session chair of that decision prior to the printing of the Call for Papers (mid-November).
- Prearranged special sessions may also be assembled by a member and submitted in full to the Executive Director by March 1 of the year in

which the convention will be held. The proposal should include program copy showing the names of the chair, presenters, and discussants, along with their academic affiliations and presentation titles. Session chairs should include in their proposal only the names of panelists who have formally agreed to participate in the session, contingent upon its approval. The chair must obtain these tentative commitments from panelists before submitting the proposal. The packet must also include a brief abstract of each paper. A rationale citing the nature and validity of the topic and why it does not replicate existing sessions should be included. Sessions may not include more than two participants from the same institution unless the institution is the focus of the session itself. Chairs of pre-formed special topic sessions will be informed of the Executive Board's decision on its inclusion in the program by mid-March, also dependent upon suitability of topic and available meeting space.

Seminars

- Seminars are 90-minute, pre-formed meetings of 8-10 members, presenting on a single topic of scholarly interest. Seminars may include up to three scholars from the same institution and up to half of the presenters may be graduate students.
- In a seminar, all presenters submit their completed paper to one another approximately one month in advance, so that everyone will be prepared to discuss the issues presented in the papers. In each group, 2-3 presenters are paired up, serving as primary

respondents for the other(s). At the convention, each presenter is given no more than 5 minutes to give an overview of his/her paper to the group and audience. The chair of the session then guides the discussion and/or serves as the respondent. Members of the audience are also encouraged to participate in the discussion. Seminars are usually scheduled on either the Thursday or the Saturday morning of the convention.

- Generally, no more than four seminars are arranged for a convention. The Executive Director and the Program Committee are responsible for approving seminars for each year's convention. Formal proposals for a forum should describe in detail and in a brief abstract the topic and nature of the proposed forum, include biographical information on its participants. If the proposed seminar entails the payment of honoraria or expenses for speakers or special equipment, an estimate of such costs should also be provided. The deadline for submission of proposals is March 1. Members will be notified of the decision on their proposals by March 15.

Forums

- Forums are large public meetings on topics of broad general interest.
- In addition to the main session of ninety minutes, a maximum of two related workshops may be organized to treat specialized aspects of the general topic.
- Generally, no more than six forums are arranged for a convention. The Executive Director and the Program Committee are responsible for approving forums

for each year's convention. Formal proposals for a forum should describe in detail and in a brief abstract the topic and nature of the proposed forum, include biographical information on its participants, and explain the number and purpose of related workshops. If the proposed forum entails the payment of honoraria or expenses for speakers or special equipment, an estimate of such costs should also be provided. The deadline for submission of proposals is March 1. Members will be notified of the decision on their proposals by March 15.

Special Events

- Members may propose special events, including readings, films, performances, etc. The Executive Director, with the assistance of the Program Committee, reviews all requests and makes a decision on their inclusion based on cost, space/time available, and appeal to membership.
- Outside sponsors of special events (corporate or institutional) may be sought for special events, and indeed, may be desirable to help defray the potential costs of the event.
- The deadline for RMMLA Secretariat receipts of all requests for special events is March 1 of the year in which the convention will be held.
- Department chairs and job applicants are welcome to use the annual convention as a convenient occasion for scheduling job interviews. The Association does not, however, have sufficient administrative personnel to be involved in the scheduling or arrangements of such interviews.

Affiliate Organization Sessions	Paper Proposals
- Affiliate organizations may each hold one session, not to exceed ninety minutes, at the Association's convention. - Affiliate organizations may also request to hold another, possibly a business meeting or other, to be scheduled outside of the normal convention hours, and as space allows. - Individuals in the affiliated organization who participate in the convention must be current members of the RMMLA and must pay all applicable convention registration fees.	- Each session needs a minimum of three papers, although four is acceptable. - The chair reviews paper proposals submitted by March 1 and selects (preferably) four of the best proposals. If proposals are few, the chair is responsible for soliciting additional proposals from among colleagues, from field- specific listservs, etc. If the chair receives an overwhelming number of very good proposals, s/he may request of the Executive Director a second section of a session. These requests will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis, but cannot be confirmed (a) until all sessions listed on the CFP have been accommodated and (b)until it is determined that meeting space is available.
GUIDELINES FOR SESSION CHAIRS Session Organization	
Every session at the RMMLA convention has a chair.	Chairs should NOT accept papers from more than two members from his/her home institution or more than two members from the same institution, unless the focus of that session is specifically related to the institution, unless it is the local host institution, or unless last minute cancellations force the chair to recruit colleagues into the session. Such situations must have the approval of the RMMLA Executive Director.
Membership - Session chairs MUST be current in the following year's dues by November 1 to be listed in the Call for Papers. Failure to renew by this date will mean that a replacement chair will be sought or the session canceled. - It is the chair's duty to remind all members of his/her session that they must be current in their RMMLA dues by April 1 of the convention year. When submitting their program information, session chairs will not be able to add the names of presenters who have not paid dues.	- Requests for sessions involving undergraduate students should be addressed to the Executive Director. - The chair notifies all who proposed papers of their acceptance or rejection preferably by March 15. Please respect this deadline, as some members submit to multiple sessions and they need to know if and where they have

been accepted. Chairs are asked to contact everyone who submitted a proposal, whether accepted or not, to inform them of the decision regarding their proposal.

- If chairs have not received enough good proposals by March 1, they may request an extension of 30 days maximum from the Executive Director. If, after the extension, the session is still not full, the Executive Director may cancel the session.
- Chairs may present in their own session, but are encouraged to find another session in which to present.

Waivers for Special Speakers

- Requests for waivers of membership dues and convention registration fees for a special presenter/discussant whom a chair wishes to invite must be submitted to the Secretariat by **April 1**.
- Waiver requests must be accompanied by a brief justification and a biographical summary of the proposed special speaker.
- The decision to grant the waiver will be made by the Executive Board.
- Only a limited number of waivers is available per convention and only one waiver is allowed per session.

Program

- The chair **MUST** submit session/presenter information to the RMMLA Secretariat by **May 1** so that online program can be set in a timely manner.
- The chair submits this information using the PROGRAM FORM FOR

SESSION CHAIRS on the Conventions page of this site. The chair enters the name of the presenter, as well as the paper title and presenter institution.

- The information provided by the Chair on this form will be used to generate the print version of the program. Notices will be sent to all chairs of final deadlines for changes/additions to programs, giving ample time for them to respond. Once the program is sent to press, however, changes will only be reflected on the online version of the program.
- Organizers of special topic sessions should note that substantial changes to the original list of panelists may result in the cancellation of the approved session, since sessions are approved on the basis of the proposals and paper titles submitted.
- The presenter must be current in dues. If session chairs cannot find the presenter's name in the online directory, chairs must notify the presenter to pay dues. Once payment is made, however, chairs may go back to the online form and enter the information.
- The chair and the RMMLA Secretariat should be notified immediately if a presenter is not going to be able to attend the convention. If more than one presenter cancels, the chair has the option of (a) canceling the session, or (b) if notified early enough, contacting the author of a paper s/he was not able to accept for reasons of space (rather than the quality of the proposal) to see if this author will present.

Scheduling Requests

- The Executive Director sets the schedule based on the session topic (trying to avoid overlap in all time slots), the anticipated size of the session, and any special requests. We also try to rotate sessions, so that a session does not get placed in the same time slot year after year.
- Scheduling requests must be received by **May 1** in order to be considered.

Moderating the Session

- Prior to the convention, the chair may want to contact the presenters to obtain some information with which to present them at the convention.
- At the convention, the chair introduces the topic and the speakers, moderates the session, making sure that presenters have equal time to present and that time remains for discussion.
- Sessions at the RMMLA convention run 90 minutes. If a chair has three papers, that gives approximately 5 minutes for introductions, 20-22 minutes per paper, and 15-20 minutes for questions. If a chair has four papers, that gives approximately 5 minutes for introductions, 15-17 minutes per paper, and 15-20 minutes for questions.
- Colored cards are located at the speaker's table for Chairs to discretely signal 5 and 2 minutes of time remaining for each presenter. Chairs have the authority to ask a presenter to stop if going over the allotted time.
- The Chair of each session may recommend an outstanding paper(s) to the editors of the *Rocky Mountain*

Review, who will, in turn, contact the presenter to encourage him/her to revise the paper with a view to possible publication in the print or online journal.

- The Chair of each session may recommend an outstanding presentation by a graduate student for the "Charles Davis Award for the Outstanding Graduate Student Presentation at the RMMLA Convention." Nominations are due to the Secretariat by November 15. Nominees are then notified and asked to submit their papers.

Session Elections

- At the end of the session, the chair holds an election for a new session chair and then submits the results to the RMMLA Secretariat by **November 1** – either at the convention registration desk convention or by email.
- Elections in Special Topic Sessions may be held IF the group wishes to be listed in the Call for Papers for the following year, but approval of the session is not automatic. Special Topic Sessions must be requested and are included on a space-available, topic-approval basis. See "Special Topic Sessions" for more complete information (page 12).
- For the new chair to be listed in the Call for Papers, s/he must be current in dues for the following year by **November 1** at the latest.
- The Call for Papers is posted on the RMMLA Web site by mid-November, using the contact information that on file for the new session chair. Members must make sure that the address / email / phone / fax given to RMMLA

is the one to appear in the CFP, which is available worldwide. Changes to contact information can be made online at www.rmmla.org or can be emailed to jlandeir@uwyo.edu.

Chair Cancellation

- Should the session chair not be able to attend the convention or fulfill the duties of chair, s/he should ask the presenters if any one of them is able to chair the session.
- Once a new chair is identified, the Secretariat must be informed.

Chair Rotation

- To encourage new member participation in organizing Regular Sessions at the convention and to allow members to develop new directions of inquiry in these sessions, chairs should encourage rotation in the election of new session officers, such that no one person may chair the same session two years in a row OR more than twice in a five year period.
- The Executive Director may intervene and name a chair if the rotation system fails.
- Former chairs may present papers in that session and/or chair other regular or special topic sessions

GUIDELINES FOR PRESENTERS

General Guidelines

- One does not have to be a member of RMMLA to propose a paper, but one must become a member by **April 1** to appear in the program.
- Paper proposals based on a 300-word abstract are due to the session chair no later than **March 1**. The session chair is asked to notify applicants by March 15 of his/her selections.
- Members may submit papers to different session chairs. **However, no one may read more than one paper at the convention.** Members may, however, serve as presenter, chair and discussant at a single convention. Involvement as an invited participant in a Special Event does not factor into this count.
- If one has a paper accepted in more than one session, it will be necessary to decide which to give and then notify the chair of the session to be dropped, as well as the RMMLA Secretariat of this choice. Failure to do so may mean elimination of one or both papers from the program. If a presenter is found to have two papers on the program and cannot be contacted to choose which one to drop, the Executive Director will choose, taking into account only how this will affect the two sessions concerned.
- Please limit remarks to the time allotted, in order to leave time for questions. In session with three presenters, this means 20 minutes; in session with four presenters, this means 15 minutes.

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- Members who propose papers are expected to attend the convention to read at the scheduled time. The Program Committee does everything possible to vary the day/time a session meets from year to year, and to accommodate scheduling requests received by May 1, but not all requests can be granted. If an applicant has a paper accepted for the convention, we ask that s/he plan to attend and share her/his research/work. If one must cancel, please let the session chair and RMMLA know in a timely manner so that a replacement can be found.
 - Papers may NOT be read in absentia, or by Skype or any electronic means.
 - No one may read more than one paper.
 - If the session chair does not arrive, please delegate someone as temporary chair/moderator and continue with the session, both for the sake of the audience and for the sake of the presenters who have made the effort to travel to the convention to present their paper and get feedback on their ideas. In such situations, senior faculty are urged to take on this responsibility, thereby modeling academic professionalism to junior faculty and graduate students who may be participating. *Thank you to all for your understanding and professionalism in this situation. RMMLA can do nothing to guarantee that a session chair will be present at his/her session. If we know ahead of time, we try to find a replacement, but if we are not given notice, there is nothing that we can do, so we appreciate your help.*
 - Substitute chairs are also asked to hold elections for a new chair for the following year's convention. Please fill out the online form by November 1 or email the information to the Secretariat (jlandeir@uwyo.edu).

ACCESS GUIDELINES

The Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association is committed to making arrangements that allow all members to participate fully in the convention. All session chairs and presenters are asked to review the following information and take the necessary steps to make their sessions accessible to attendees with permanent or temporary disabilities. While the guidelines listed below are designed to provide access to all attendees with disabilities, many will benefit all convention participants.

ROOM SETUP

Space has been left for one wheelchair in each meeting room. Please keep this area and the aisles clear for persons who may be using wheelchairs, canes, crutches, or motorized vehicles. Space should be left around the doors and aisles to allow access.

People who are deaf or hard of hearing and who use sign language interpreters or read lips need to sit where they can see both the speakers and the interpreter. Speakers should avoid speaking from a darkened area of the room so their lips and faces can be visible. Interpreters may stand close to the speaker or within a direct line of sight to allow the audience to view both the speaker and the interpreter. Speakers should be aware of the location of interpreters and keep this line of vision clear. Close doors and turn off projection equipment to reduce background noise and help focus audience attention.

PAPERS, HANDOUTS, AND AUDIOVISUALS

Speakers are asked to bring an extra copy of their papers, even in draft form, for the use of those who want to follow a written text. Speakers who use handouts should prepare a few copies in large-print format (boldface, 14-16-point font size on white paper) and briefly describe the materials to the audience and allow ample time to distribute them. Speakers should indicate whether they want their papers and handouts returned.

Consider the possibility that persons in the audience may be blind. Allow ample time when referring to a visual aid or handout, or when pointing out the location of materials. Briefly describe the materials.

COMMUNICATION AND PRESENTATION

Speak clearly and distinctly, but do not shout. Use regular speed unless asked to slow down by members of the audience, sign interpreters, or persons using real-time captioning. Practice timing your presentation to avoid having to speak too quickly.

Since microphones can fail to pick up voices in the audience and because voices from the front of the room may be hard to hear from the back of the room, speakers should repeat questions or statements made by the audience. In dialogues or discussions, only one person should speak at a time, and questioners should identify themselves. We appreciate your consideration and implementation of these requests.

“A Multi-Lingual Priest Confronts a Multi-Religious World: Ramon Martí (fl. 1250-84) and the Religions of the Book”

The greatest European linguist between late antiquity and the seventeenth century, Ramon Martí had exquisite expertise in Hebrew, Aramaic, and Arabic. As a member of the Dominican order of priests, he was called to preach the Gospel to the whole world, and his surviving works reveal that he took this calling seriously. He had read widely in the core texts of both Islam and Judaism and put this reading to use in writing deeply learned works against those religions. But his engagement with these religions and their intellectual traditions was in certain ways puzzling. For one thing, he had far more to say about Judaism than Islam, despite the fact that he lived in the Crown of Aragon that had a huge population of restive Muslim subjects, but only a tiny, non-threatening community of Jews. For another, while he clearly was a hostile critic of Islam, he was a life-long admirer of Arab philosophy, which he read in Arabic until the end of his life. This lecture will explore his intense and surprising interrogation of the religions of the book.

Thomas E. Burman is the Michael P. Grace Professor of Medieval Studies and Professor of History at the University of Notre Dame and the author of Religious Polemic and the Intellectual History of the Mozarabs, c. 1050-1200 (1994); Reading the Qur'an in Latin Christendom, 1140-1560 (2007); and, with Brian A. Catlos and Mark D. Meyerson, of The Sea in the Middle: The Mediterranean World, 650-1650 (2022). In 2025-26, he was a Member of the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton.

“Cinema Therapy:

A Look at French Director Romane Bohringer”

While she was adapting politician Clémentine Autain’s eponymous autobiographical narrative (*Dites-lui que je l’aime*, 2019) about her childhood relationship with her mother, filmmaker Romane Bohringer soon realized that her own complicated childhood paralleled Autain’s childhood and needed to be woven into what would be her second film. Bohringer dives deep into her personal history and searches for traces of her mother, before and after she was abandoned as a 9-month-old baby. The project allows Bohringer to understand and accept her mother’s life choices and forge ahead with her own trajectory to become an acclaimed director. She and Autain strongly believe that from that point, their stories once told will stop the cycle of violence and pain they both endured as children without mothers. This presentation addresses the strenuous process taken by Romane Bohringer from actress to director, and mother as well as Autain’s path.

Sylvie Blum-Reid is professor of French and film at the University of Florida. She teaches French and European films, as well as drama. She has been a member of WIF since 1999. She has published the following books: *Traveling in French Cinema* (London: Palgrave MacMillan 2016), *East-West Encounters. Franco-Asian Cinema and Literature* (London: Wallflower press/Columbia U.P. 2003) and recently an edited anthology, *Impressions from Paris:*

Using Communication to Foster Authentic and Creative Interactions

In this interactive workshop, Maureen McBride will share ideas for how instructors can help students use communication—with each other, with instructors, with community members—as a way to forward learning and engage in authentic conversations, knowledge vulnerability, and creative interactions. Maureen will help attendees explore how encouraging communication like this can generate unique moments of exploration. She will draw on interdisciplinary research on mentorship, communication, creativity, and vulnerability. Attendees will be invited to reflect on their own experiences leading classrooms of students, interacting with colleagues, and engaging in personal spaces and relationships to identify the strategies that can create concrete plans for assignments, classroom interactions, and maybe even office hours. Maureen McBride has been the Director of the Writing & Speaking Center at the University of Nevada, Reno for 15 years. She contributes to the UNR Writing & Speaking Initiative, specifically collaborating to provide a Fellows program to support projects in primarily



STEM-based courses. She has an MA in writing, a PhD in composition and rhetoric with an emphasis in peer-to-peer writing support, and an MS in education with an emphasis on equity and diversity. “Balas, Bailes, y Besos: Deconstructing Maternal Influence, Romantic Alliances, and Frontier Womanhood in the Billy the Kid-El Bilito Mythos”

“**B**alas, Bailes, y Besos” analyzes how nineteenth-century maternal influence, romantic alliances, and frontier womanhood shaped the mythos of Billy the Kid, tracing the evolution of female agency from Pat Garrett’s 1882 biography and Walter Noble Burns’s 1925 work to the modern MGM+ series Billy the Kid. The study illustrates how historical, often marginalized, female figures are re-contextualized from passive tropes into active, powerful agents of survival and community in the American Southwest.

CC Aragón is from Santa Fe, New Mexico and is Chicana-Indigenous (Navajo) and Mexican-American. She earned her MEA from the University of New Mexico and her PhD at Arizona State University. She is a Professor of Theatre and Dance and American and Cultural Studies at the University of Wyoming.

Imagine a story where the well-meaning but misguided antagonists bring together elemental aspects of the universe to create a new tool. Maybe a gauntlet? Then, the tool is used to wreak havoc on humanity and cause irreparable damage to its users. Some might say it is *INEVITABLE*. The protagonists improbably use the tool themselves to set the wrongs right, but the world is changed forever. What? That is the plot of Avengers: Infinity War/End Game? That may be a story many of us know, but I was talking about Artificial Intelligence! We are right at the part where half (less? more?) of the effort, engagement, and education of our students is turning to dust. How do we flip the script and use the freely available and ubiquitous Large Language Model (LLM) AI programs to our students' advantage? Make the AI models more like us, of course! In this workshop, you will interact with at least one LLM and work to develop prompts to guide your students to further their learning. To fully participate, it is encouraged that you bring an internet accessing device with a keyboard, a moderately sized sample of non-proprietary written work, and directions for an assignment you would like to retool/improve.



Nicholas is an Associate Professor of Chemistry and co-director of the writing center at California Northstate University's College of Health Sciences. He earned his B.S. in Chemistry at the University of Notre Dame and his Ph.D. in Chemistry at Northwestern University where his research focused on methods in computational chemistry. While teaching chemistry courses, has been inspired by fellow faculty with backgrounds in Service-Learning and English to create authentic assignments that amalgamate science, writing, communication, and humanity. - Footnotes are unacceptable. Endnotes are to be inserted mechanically, not created within the program, and precede the Works Cited section.

Abstract: An informative and comprehensive abstract of 50 to 100 words must accompany the manuscript when first submitted. No identifying information may be included on the abstract page.

Documentation: Writers are responsible for checking the accuracy of references and for ensuring that complete information is provided in the Works Cited section for sources referenced in the text.

Figures and Images: It is the author's responsibility to seek and to obtain written permission from the copyright holder to reproduce any visual or other materials accompanying the manuscript.

Review Process: All articles submitted for consideration, whether they appear in the print or Web version of *The Rocky Mountain Review*, undergo a scholarly review process. Details about the review process and a list of members of the

Editorial Board are included on the www.rmmla.org website. Manuscripts will not be returned to authors.

Acceptance and Publication: Once a submission is accepted for publication, its author provides the following to the Editor by e-mail to: jlandeir@uwyo.edu.

- a clean, fully revised version of the article with mechanical endnotes and list of works cited
- a short abstract
- a biographical note of approximately 50 words

The article is then copy-edited and prepared for publication. The print journal is published semi-annually, in the spring and fall semesters, and mailed to those who have opted to pay a supplemental print mailing fee. Submissions are accepted on a rolling basis and are published in the order that they are accepted, as space allows. Editors bear the final responsibility for the journal, and reserve the right to refuse an article that is excessively tardy or otherwise unsuitable. Manuscripts receiving a “revise and resubmit” recommendation will be kept on file for two years. Following publication in the print version of *The Rocky Mountain Review*, authors will receive three complimentary copies of the journal issue featuring their article.

BOOK/MEDIA REVIEWS:

Submission: Reviews should be submitted ELECTRONICALLY as a Word document (.doc or .docx, NOT .pdf) to Joy Landeira, Managing Editor, jlandeir@uwyo.edu. Please include your name and phone number in the e-mail. RMMLA membership is required to serve as a book/media reviewer for the journal. *Reviews should be submitted within three months of book receipt.* All corrections and revisions must be completed by **August 31st** for the fall issue and **December 31st** for the spring issue. Editors bear the final responsibility for the journal, and reserve the right to refuse a review that is excessively tardy or otherwise unsuitable.

Format: Reviews should be two to four manuscript pages in length, approximately 800 words, double-spaced, and conform to the latest MLA style. Footnotes are not allowed; endnotes and lengthy quotations should be avoided.

Publishing: Reviews are printed in alphabetical order, according to the name of the author of the work reviewed. *The Rocky Mountain Review* is indexed in these scholarly indexes:

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RMMLA-Huntington Library Research/Residency Grant

In conjunction with the Huntington Library in San Marino, California, the RMMLA offers a \$3000 stipend to support one month of residency and research at the Library. All current members of the RMMLA are eligible for the RMMLA-Huntington Library Research Grant, and we especially encourage graduate students and junior faculty to apply.

The Huntington Library has a rich collection of rare books and manuscripts principally in the fields of British and American history and literature. Other research strengths include 15th-century books, history of science, and maritime history.

For the general public, the library has on display some of the finest rare books and manuscripts of the Anglo-American civilization. Among the treasures on exhibition are the Ellesmere manuscript of Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, a copy of the Gutenberg Bible on vellum, the double-elephant folio edition

of Audubon's *Birds of America*, and an unsurpassed collection of the early editions of Shakespeare's works.

For qualified scholars, the Huntington is one of the largest and most complete research libraries in the United States in its fields of specialization. Altogether there are about five million items available for research. For more information on the Huntington, visit their website at www.huntington.org.

The application deadline for the RMMLA-Huntington Library Research Grant is **March 1** (postmark deadline) to the RMMLA Secretariat. *Criteria for selection include value of the project, appropriateness of the research to material available at the Huntington, promise and experience of the researcher, and proposed use of and dissemination of the project results.*

To apply, please send BY EMAIL (jlandeir@uwyo.edu) an application packet including:

- A current curriculum vitae (maximum 2 pages);
- A description of the proposed project indicating which Huntington materials will be used and the approximate dates of the research residency; and
- A cover letter in which the applicant states that, if chosen as the recipient, s/he (a) will use all funds for the purpose of research; (b) will serve on the selection committee for the following year's competition; and (c) will submit a 2-3 page final report within six months of the project's completion.

The winner of the award is announced by March 1.

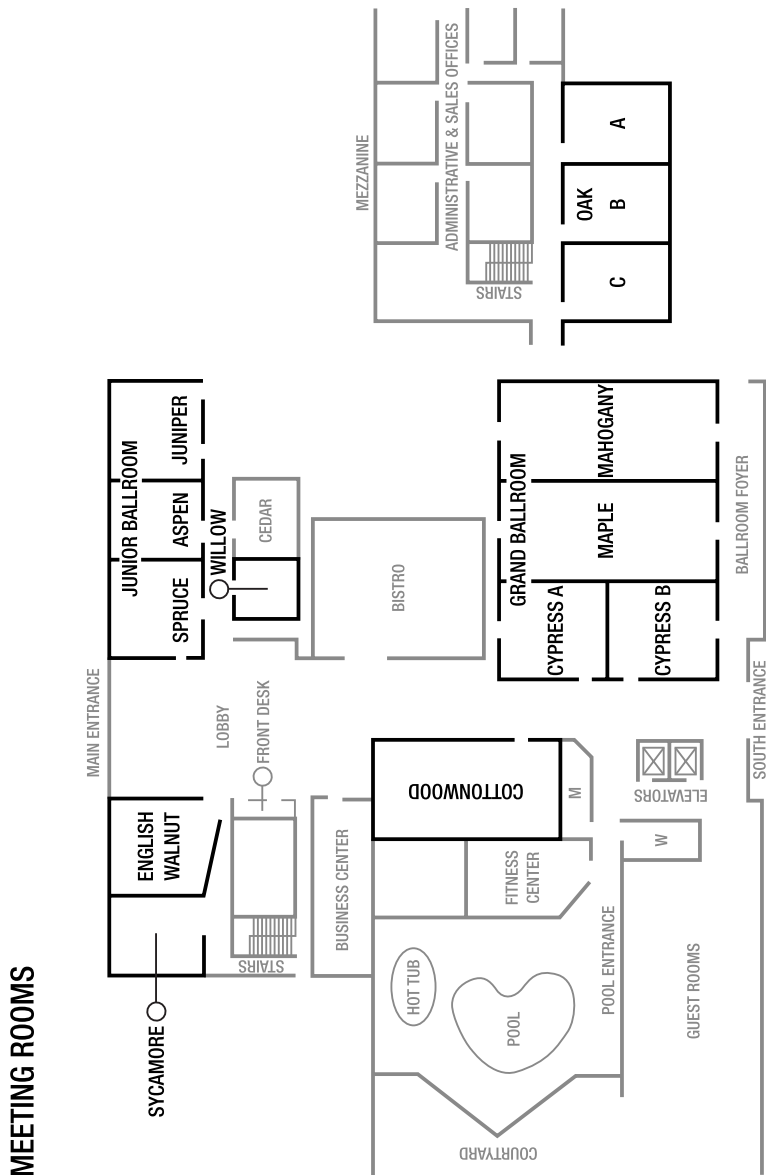
